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Leadership Insights

Shaping and Improving Personal Character through Teamwork

Personal character plays a vital role in both social life and organisational settings. It reflects the true nature, values, and behaviour of an individual in adapting to relationships with family members, colleagues, and wider communities. Character refers to the natural traits within a person; however, these traits are not static. They can be shaped and improved according to environmental influences, personal needs, and life experiences. As management expert Peter Drucker stated, “Management is doing things right; leadership is doing the right things.” This highlights that beyond skills and efficiency, strong personal character or *sahsiah* is fundamental in guiding ethical behaviour and responsible decision-making.

As human beings, no individual is capable of living independently; everyone requires support, guidance, and the ideas of others. Regardless of knowledge or expertise, collaboration remains essential for personal growth and collective success. This understanding is reflected in the concept of *insan*, which signifies a being in constant need of guidance and mutual support. From this perspective, teamwork becomes a key platform through which personal character is shaped and strengthened.

The formation of good character begins early in life through the learning environment and guidance provided by parents or guardians. This foundation is later reinforced through interaction with others, particularly in organisational settings, where individuals learn responsibility, cooperation, and accountability. Through teamwork and the exchange of views, individuals learn to reflect on their behaviour, adapt to different perspectives, and improve themselves through shared experiences.

The strengthening of personal character also occurs when individuals possess the awareness and willingness to change for the better. This awareness is manifested through



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effective communication, continuous self-improvement, and the mutual exchange of ideas towards positive outcomes. In an organisational context, harmonious teamwork is achieved when individuals perform their duties sincerely and practise *ihsan*, without comparing the weight of their responsibilities to those of others. Understanding the emotional needs and personal circumstances of colleagues further strengthens unity and trust within a team.



Cultivating positive assumptions (*husnu zan*) is equally important in teamwork. A colleague's low job performance or lack of motivation may stem from personal or family challenges rather than intentional misconduct. Such empathy prevents negative judgment and fosters a supportive working environment. This spirit of understanding contributes to trust, which Stephen Covey described as "the glue of life" and the foundation of effective communication.

The importance of personal character is also reflected in annual performance evaluations such as SKT and promotion assessments, demonstrating management's expectation that employees carry out their responsibilities with integrity, accountability, and dedication. While organisational systems and communication structures are important, a truly strong and harmonious organisation is built on the moral responsibility and positive mindset of its members.

Three approaches can be adopted to shape and improve personal character through teamwork. First, individuals must develop self-awareness to perform good deeds based on responsibility, *amanah*, and religious guidance. Second, individuals should strive to improve their weaknesses by engaging with colleagues who provide constructive feedback or by seeking advice from senior members. Third, character development occurs through active participation in meetings, programmes, and social activities, where shared experiences naturally strengthen both teamwork and personal growth.

It is through this collective process that teamwork truly thrives. Teamwork involves collaboration, understanding individual circumstances, and complementing one another's strengths and weaknesses. As Henry Ford stated, "Working together is success."

UMT Researchers' Book Wins Best Scholarly Book Award in Science and Technology

A book written by two Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT) researchers has been named the recipient of the Best Scholarly Book Award in Science and Technology (Appreciation Award) at the recently held 16th Malaysian Academic Publishers Council - Ministry of Higher Education (MAPIM – KPT) Awards Ceremony, marking another proud milestone for the university.

The book titled *Fishes of Kenyir*, published by UMT Publisher, is the result of research conducted by Dr. Mohamad Aqmal Mohd Naser and Associate Professor Dr. Amiruddin Ahmad from the Institute of Tropical Biodiversity and Sustainable Development (IBTPL).

Both authors are actively involved in freshwater biodiversity research in Malaysia.

Fishes of Kenyir is bound to make a significant impact on the research and education landscape by providing important information on freshwater fish species, including those classified as endangered and critically endangered. Its contents support conservation efforts in line with Malaysia's Sustainable Development Goal (SDG 15), which emphasizes the importance of conserving terrestrial and freshwater ecosystems.

According to Dr. Mohamad Aqmal, the award is a prestigious recognition that reflects the confidence in the contributions of researchers in the field of national aquatic resource conservation.

"This award is not only a form of recognition for our research outcomes, but also a source of motivation for us to continue producing scholarly work and contributing to environmental conservation," he said.

Dr Mohamad Aqmal also expressed his appreciation to all parties who supported the production of the book.

Meanwhile, Associate Professor Dr. Amiruddin, who is also the Regional Co-Chair for the Mainland and Peninsular Southeast Asia region under the IUCN-SSC/Wetlands International Freshwater Fish Specialist Group, stated that this success is the result of continuous and tireless efforts.



This achievement not only strengthens UMT's reputation as a leading university in biodiversity research, natural ecosystem conservation, and the advancement of science-based knowledge in marine and aquatic resources, but also highlights UMT's capability as an institution committed to publishing high-quality scholarly works and elevating academic research and publishing at the national level.

UMT Champions Climate Action through National Antarctica Day 2025

To send a powerful message that climate change has no borders and collective responsibility is essential, Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT) organized the National Antarctica Day 2025 in December, in collaboration with the Sultan Mizan Antarctic Research Foundation (YPASM) and the National Antarctic Research Centre (NARC).

The event featured integrated environmental and awareness activities designed to connect local action with global climate challenges. Grouped into three main sub-programmes—Growing Greens for the Land of Ice, Green Footprints, and Antarctica Day Forum—each highlighting the interconnectedness of human activities, coastal ecosystems, and the fragile Antarctic environment.

The Growing Greens for the Land of Ice programme took place at UMT beach, where participants planted 50 coastal trees, including Rhu (*Casuarina sp.*) and Ketapang (*Terminalia sp.*), species well known for their role in stabilising shorelines, reducing coastal erosion, and enhancing carbon sequestration.

Although the trees were planted in the tropics, the programme symbolically linked local environmental stewardship to the protection of Antarctica. As polar ice melts accelerate due to rising global temperatures, strengthening natural carbon sinks and coastal resilience becomes increasingly vital. This initiative demonstrated how local ecological restoration can contribute meaningfully to global climate mitigation efforts.

Green Footprints was organised to initiate a beach clean-up at UMT beach, involving 100 participants comprising volunteers from UMT, Kuala Terengganu Municipal Council, Terengganu State Forestry Department, and the NGOs *Geng Plastik Ijo* and Pengkalan Jie Fisheries Community. Over 265 kilograms of waste were collected, mostly plastic debris.

This activity highlighted the pervasive issue of marine pollution and its widespread impacts, including on polar ecosystems. Plastic waste originating from populated coastlines can travel vast ocean distances, eventually reaching remote regions such as Antarctica. By addressing pollution at its source, the programme reinforced the message that protecting the polar regions begins with responsible actions at home.



The Antarctica Day Forum marked the culmination of the meaningful initiative. The forum provided a platform for academic discourse and public engagement on the importance of Antarctica in regulating the Earth's climate system. Discussions focused on the role of Antarctic ice in sea-level regulation, global ocean circulation, and climate stability, as well as Malaysia's growing involvement in polar research through the National Antarctic Research Centre (NARC).

The forum successfully translated complex scientific concepts into accessible knowledge, fostering greater awareness among students and staff about the global implications of polar environmental change.

The holistic approach that combined education, hands-on environmental action, and global environmental narratives made the National Antarctica Day 2025 more impactful.

By organising the event, UMT demonstrated leadership in sustainability, environmental education, and climate advocacy.

UMT Researcher Awarded Grant from Sultan Mizan Antarctic Research Foundation

A Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT) researcher has been awarded a research grant from Sultan Mizan Antarctic Research Foundation (YPASM), marking a significant milestone in Malaysia's efforts to strengthen its role in Antarctic governance and international policy engagement.

The researcher, Dr. Madzli Harun from the Faculty of Maritime Studies, said the grant will support a policy-driven research project that focuses on Antarctica as a strategic geopolitical and legal domain, rather than solely a site for scientific exploration.

Dr. Madzli described the award as an opportunity to expand Malaysia's influence within the international Antarctic regime.


"Antarctica is often seen as a land without owners, inhabited only by scientists and penguins, but in reality, it is one of the most complex geopolitical laboratories in the world," he said. "Behind its silence lies an international system that determines how global resources are managed, how climate change is monitored, and where countries like Malaysia stand in the global order."

Malaysia has been actively involved in Antarctic research since 2011 through scientific expeditions and collaborations. However, the country currently holds Non-Consultative Party status under the Antarctic Treaty System, limiting its influence in high-level decision-making.

According to Dr. Madzli, this gap underscores the need for stronger policy and legal engagement.

"We have sent our scientists and contributed meaningfully to research, but our voice at the negotiating table remains limited," he said. "Without translating scientific contributions into diplomatic leverage, Malaysia risks being sidelined in strategic decisions about Antarctica's future."

Through the foundation-funded study, Dr. Madzli aims to produce a comprehensive policy paper examining state liability, responsibility, and governance mechanisms within the Antarctic Treaty framework. The research is intended to support national institutions in strengthening Malaysia's position at the Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting (ATCM).



"My objective is to ensure that science is supported by strong policy arguments," he said. "This is essential if Malaysia is to pursue Consultative Party status and play a meaningful role in shaping Antarctic governance."

Dr. Madzli's work will draw on his extensive experience in international policy negotiations, including his involvement in Malaysia's successful bid for full membership in the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC) and his contribution to the D-8 Global Vision.

"Those experiences showed that Malaysia can succeed in global regimes when backed by clear legal and policy strategies," he added.

The grant also highlights UMT's growing role as a centre of excellence not only in tropical marine science, but also in strategic environmental policy and international governance. By supporting research that links science, policy, and diplomacy, UMT continues to enhance its contribution to national sustainability, coastal resilience, and Malaysia's global standing.

Scientific Expedition at Kong Kong Wetlands for Biodiversity Conservation and Community Development

Universiti Malaysia Terengganu's Institute of Aquaculture and Fisheries (AKUATROP) recently led a cross-institutional scientific research expedition to the Kong Kong wetlands in Pasir Gudang, Johor, to uncover the area's ecological significance.

Serving as the scientific backbone of the expedition, AKUATROP played a pivotal role in coordinating the research design, standardizing sampling protocols, and fostering interdisciplinary collaboration among researchers from Universiti Malaya, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, Universiti Putra Malaysia, Universiti Malaysia Sarawak, and Universiti Tun Hussein Onn Malaysia.

AKUATROP further enhanced the expedition's impact by engaging local communities, particularly fishermen, in basic scientific monitoring activities, thereby strengthening their understanding of wetland ecosystems while promoting participatory research through the Living Lab framework.

The preliminary findings indicate that the Kong Kong wetlands support a high diversity of aquatic flora and fauna, including commercially important species, endemic organisms, and ecologically sensitive taxa. Early observations suggest that the area functions as a critical nursery and feeding ground for various marine and estuarine species.

These findings highlight the ecological significance of Kong Kong as a natural buffer that supports fisheries productivity and ecosystem resilience.

The integration of local environmental knowledge from fishermen with scientific data further enhanced the accuracy and relevance of the findings, providing a more comprehensive understanding of ecosystem dynamics and environmental change.

A key outcome of the expedition is the development of local citizen scientists. By equipping community members with basic scientific skills and ecological awareness, the expedition empowered them to become frontline stewards of the wetland ecosystem. Their continuous involvement ensures long-term monitoring, early detection of environmental threats, and sustainable resource management.



Based on the data and experience gained from the expedition sponsored by Kumpulan Masari Holdings Sdn. Bhd., several future initiatives have been proposed. These include the establishment of a Kong Kong Wetlands Community Gallery as a permanent knowledge and heritage centre, showcasing biodiversity records, fishermen's history, ecological maps, and long-term environmental changes.

In the longer term, the systematic conservation of the Kong Kong wetlands may support its elevation as a state park. Such recognition would strengthen legal protection, enhance institutional management, and position Kong Kong as a hub for environmental education, sustainable tourism, and high-impact scientific research.

These initiatives align closely with regional development agendas for ensuring that biodiversity conservation contributes directly to socio-economic development and intergenerational well-being.

With sustained commitment from academic institutions, industry partners, government agencies, and local communities, Kong Kong has strong potential to become a national model for community-based wetland conservation and sustainable development.

The expedition demonstrates that collaborative efforts can advance environmental conservation, scientific research, and community empowerment simultaneously.

UMT's Cyber Literacy Programme Empowers Digitally Resilient Community

Aiming to strengthen digital safety awareness among senior citizens and school students, UMT's Faculty of Computer Science and Mathematics (FSKM) has recently organized the first series of a community-driven programme, **CyberSAFE: Digitally Resilient Community**.

Faculty dean Prof. Ts. Dr. Muhammad Suzuri Hitam said the rising complexity of digital threats demands collective action across generations.

"Efforts to strengthen cyber literacy are not merely programme initiatives, but a social responsibility to protect our communities," he said. "With the increasing cases of online fraud, data theft and digital exploitation, continuous education is the key to building a more resilient and digitally conscious society."

The programme featured interactive learning sessions facilitated under the E3-SDG Integrated Community Engagement Model, a unique framework developed by FSKM that emphasises the Engage– Educate–Empower (E3) approach. Through hands-on activities, cyber awareness modules and real-world case sharing, participants received practical exposure on identifying online scams, protecting personal data, and navigating technology safely.

The programme received overwhelmingly positive responses, particularly from senior citizen participants who are often targeted by online scammers.

"This is truly beneficial. The data presented shows scams are increasing, and we retirees are among their targets," said a representative from the Masjid Tok Jembal community. "This initiative is a very important step to protect society and pensioners like us."

Meanwhile, student participants expressed newfound awareness of how fast digital crimes are evolving.

"Before joining, I didn't realise there were so many scam types," one of the students said. "When technology becomes smarter, scams also become smarter."

"I also learned that if we get scammed, we can report through 997," the student added. "That's something I just discovered today. Now I know we don't have to be afraid to report."



Supported by the Ministry of Higher Education through funding from the Malaysian National Commission for UNESCO (SKUM), the initiative marked an important milestone in UMT's ongoing commitment to safeguarding the digital well-being of the local community.

The programme was conducted in collaboration with the Digital Ecosystem Centre (PED), Centre for Knowledge Transfer, Industry and Community Linkages (PPIJIM), the Royal Malaysia Police (PDRM), Terengganu State Education Department (JPNT), and local community leaders.

The programme was led by Santuni Komuniti students from the mathematics programme, reflecting UMT's strong emphasis on student-led community engagement and high-impact learning. By involving students directly in the engagement process, the programme not only strengthens public awareness but also provides high-impact experiential learning for future graduates.

The second instalment, themed S.M.A.R.T – Secure, Mindful, Aware, Responsible, Trusted, will be held in January 2026, targeting Small and Medium Industry (SME) entrepreneurs, civil servants and youth in Terengganu.

UMT Empowers Student Leadership through Special Workshop

HEPA's Centre for Student Development and Empowerment held the Organizational Strengthening Workshop with the objective of enhancing student leaders' understanding of organizational management, financial governance, leadership integrity, and the development of collaborative networks.

According to UMT Deputy Vice Chancellor (Student Affairs and Alumni) Professor Dr. Mohd Izani Mohd Zain, organizing the workshop is part of the university's continuous commitment to developing student leadership in a holistic manner.

"Clubs and societies are key platforms for the development of students' leadership, communication skills, and integrity," said Professor Izani in his speech during the opening ceremony of the workshop. "Through this workshop, UMT provided systematic exposure to student leaders so that they are able to manage organizations professionally, transparently, and with high impact."

During the workshop conducted in phases from 8 – 12 December, presidents and supreme council members of UMT clubs and societies for the 2025-2026 session participated in various strategic modules, including programme management procedures, organizational financial management, core leadership integrity, meeting management, university official ethics and protocol, as well as event management.

The phased training approach provided participants with the opportunity to understand leadership roles holistically, not only from a technical perspective but also in terms of values formation and personal identity.

In addition, team-building and situational leadership activities conducted at UMT's Bukit Kor campus on the final day of the workshop has had a significant impact on the participants by strengthening trust, effective communication, and decision-making abilities under pressure.

President of UMT Student Representative Council for the 2025 – 2026 session, Wan Darwisy Khazin Wan Ahmad Rosddy, said the workshop has served as an important platform in aligning the direction of student leadership to be more structured and impactful.



Overall, the workshop has successfully achieved its objectives, demonstrating an increase in participants' understanding, readiness, and confidence to lead student organizations with credibility, integrity, and high impact.

In a broader context, the organizing of the workshop reflects UMT's ongoing efforts to empower students as future leaders who are not only active on campus but are also capable of contributing meaningfully to society and the nation.

UMT remains committed to ensuring that student leadership development is implemented systematically, in phases, and in alignment with the university's aspirations as well as the Malaysia Education Blueprint (Higher Education).

Researcher Spotlight

Associate Professor Dr. Muhammad Hafiz Borkhanuddin

Associate Professor Dr. Muhammad Hafiz Borkhanuddin is a marine biologist specializing in marine biodiversity science, fish parasitology, and benthic and cryptic invertebrate ecology.

His work involves the use of modern analytical tools such as molecular identification, metabarcoding, digital specimen curation, and integrated biodiversity databases.

A major component of his scientific contribution lies in myxozoan parasitology. He holds and shares taxonomic authority for approximately ten newly described myxosporean species from Malaysia and one species from Portugal. To address persistent nomenclatural challenges, he proposed a modified naming framework aimed at reducing secondary homonymy and improving long-term taxonomic stability.

His work has also contributed to applied international efforts, including a European Horizon 2020 project (*ParaFish Control*), where insights from his research supported discussions on parasite life cycles and disease-related processes.

Dr. Hafiz also plays a leading role in regional initiatives such as the Marine Biodiversity Survey of Southeast Asia-Malaysia (MBSSEAM), working with partners from Singapore, Indonesia, and other regional institutions to advance standardised marine biodiversity inventories across Southeast Asia. Central to this effort is the use of Autonomous Reef Monitoring Structures (ARMS) as a shared ecological platform, enabling comparable, long-term assessments of reef-associated biodiversity.

Within this framework, his current research focuses on reef colonisation and succession, using ARMS to track invertebrate settlement from early biofilm stages to mature cryptic assemblages over a two-year monitoring period. This work provides critical baseline data on biodiversity often overlooked by conventional reef surveys and offers insights into reef recovery, resilience, and ecosystem functioning.

Complementing this, he leads nudibranch ecology studies, integrating field observations with gut content metabarcoding to clarify feeding strategies, habitat preferences, and trophic linkages within reef food webs.

In early 2025, Dr. Hafiz was selected to participate in the Austral Fall–Winter Joint Twilight Ross Sea Ecosystem Studies (JTRES 2025) expedition to Antarctica. His involvement in this high-latitude, extreme-environment research programme



reflects international recognition of his expertise in marine biodiversity, parasitology, and ecosystem-level investigations. The expedition contributed critical insights into Southern Ocean ecosystems during an under-studied seasonal window and strengthened Malaysia's presence in global polar marine research collaborations.

At present, Dr. Hafiz leads the Repository & Reference Centre UMT (RRC-UMT) under INOS, a national-level initiative focused on the curation, digitisation, and long-term stewardship of biodiversity specimens. Alongside this leadership role, he continues to publish in indexed international journals, serves as a reviewer and guest editor, supervises postgraduate students, and contributes to the strengthening of research infrastructure and human capital.

Beyond academia, he remains actively engaged in citizen-science and community-based initiatives. With support from Yayasan Bank Rakyat and International Petroleum Corporation (IPC) Malaysia, his work has included coral reef restoration training, public awareness programmes, and the development of a citizen-friendly handbook, with ongoing efforts centred on island communities in Terengganu.

Building Leadership from the Ground Up

In the demanding landscape of public service, where consistency, integrity, and long-term vision are paramount, Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT) alumnus Dato' Haji Adnan Hussain stands out as a leader who has demonstrated excellence, dedication, and the ability to make a meaningful impact.

With more than three decades of experience in Malaysia's fisheries sector, he currently serves as the Director General of Fisheries Malaysia, playing a pivotal role in safeguarding fisheries sustainability and national food security.

Dato' Haji Adnan's career has been shaped steadily from the ground up. He began his professional journey with a strong academic grounding in fisheries, obtaining a Diploma in Fisheries and subsequently a Bachelor of Science (Fisheries) from the then Universiti Putra Malaysia Terengganu (now known as UMT).

Early exposure to the aquaculture industry in 1994 provided him with valuable hands-on experience before he officially entered public service in 1995 as a Fisheries Officer.

Dato' Haji Adnan has served at almost every level within the Department of Fisheries Malaysia, progressing from technical and planning roles to senior management positions. His posts included Director of the Pahang State Department of Fisheries, Head of the Fisheries Institute Malaysia (Terengganu), Senior Director of the Fisheries Biosecurity Division, and Senior Director of the Fisheries Conservation and Protection Division.

His appointment as Director General of Fisheries Malaysia in March 2023 marked the culmination of a career built on professionalism, expertise and trusted leadership.

At the international level, Dato' Haji Adnan has represented Malaysia at conferences, workshops, and official meetings on fisheries governance, fisheries law and food safety across Asia, Australia and South Asia. These engagements have allowed him to align national fisheries policies with international standards.

Beyond his primary role in public service, Dato' Haji Adnan remains actively engaged in the broader ecosystem of knowledge, governance and community development. He is involved with national strategic bodies such as the Fisheries Development Authority of Malaysia (LKIM), the Maritime Institute of Malaysia (MIMA), and various national committees on science, biosecurity, and food safety.



As an alumni representative on the UMT Board of Directors, he plays a key role in bridging academia, industry, and government, in line with the university's aspiration to produce future-ready graduates who are responsive to national needs.

Dato' Haji Adnan's distinguished service has been recognised through the Excellent Service Award and the conferment of the Darjah Indera Mahkota Pahang (DIMP), which carries the title "Dato'". Beyond titles and positions, however, his true legacy lies in principled leadership grounded in integrity, knowledge, and service to society.
